As we move towards July and the proposed parish mergers (going from 8 parishes with 8 churches into 2 parishes with 8 churches), Archbishop Lucas has asked us for suggestions for new names for the 2 parishes. This is asking one of the saints in heaven to pray for each of the new parishes formed in this process. This does not change any of the church names. Each of the 8 church buildings has been consecrated to their specific saint, so their name cannot, and will not change.

The deadline for submission is Monday, February 12.

The FPPT (Family of Parishes Planning Team), which has a representative from each of the 8 church communities, will meet to compile the names and submit three name suggestions for each of the two new parish entities (six names will be sent in total) to Archbishop Lucas. He will then ultimately choose a name for each new parish entity. He is not required to choose from the names that are submitted, though he has asked for input from all of us, so let's give him our best ideas!

We've received 50 submissions so far. Some suggestions are the same, and some did not meet the criteria.

The Catholic Parish: A Gathering of Exiles

What does it mean to be an exile? An exile is a person who is not living in their native land...at its most basic level, an exile is someone who doesn't have a home. Think here of Jesus himself, when he told the scribe 'The Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.' A home is where one resides, especially as a member of a family. The word home conjures up many images.... images beyond just a physical place, images such as safety, warmth, comfort, acceptance, peace. Our parishes too can be likened to a home, for it is here where we 'reside, as a member of a family'...like a home, our parishes are meant to be a place of safety, warmth, comfort, acceptance, peace.... a place of refuge. And yet, we are still exiles...

I mention all of this in relation to the Journey of Faith that our family of parishes have been experiencing, for the words exile and parish go together. A little background. The word for exile in Greek is 'pariokia', which literally means 'live beside a house'. In other words, one does not have a home. And it is from this word that we get the English word parish. What this means is that a parish is a community of exiles…a parochial school is a 'school of exiles'. So then, a parish is a place where a community of exiles on earth (who long for their heavenly home) gather and journey together....to their heavenly homeland.

To help us see this, is where our faith comes in, for our faith helps us to see the things that are invisible, of a promised land that we can't yet physically see, our heavenly home. A passage from Hebrews is an example of this. The passage is speaking of Abraham and his family....

All these died in faith. They did not receive what had been promised but saw it and greeted it from afar and acknowledged themselves to be strangers and aliens on earth, for those who speak thus show that they are seeking a homeland.

If they had been thinking of the land from which they had come, they would have had opportunity to return. But now they desire a better homeland, a heavenly one. Therefore, God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them. (Hebrews 11:13-16)

This passage from Hebrews is saying that, even though Abraham and his family were living on earth, in the 'promised land', they were still exiles because they were longing for a 'better homeland, a heavenly one.' So, as mentioned above, a parish is a place where those of us, who are exiles on earth and who long for a heavenly homeland, gather as one, as we journey toward that heavenly promised land. To put it another way: "The local church – our parish – is meant to be the gathering of Christian 'sojourners' and 'aliens' who are far from their true home. And what is our true home? It is where God dwells.... (Keating, Daniel. First and Second Peter, Jude. Catholic Commentary on Sacred Scripture).

As we continue our Journey of Faith, I think it is helpful reflect on this, as so often we can think of our parish as just our local community (that we somehow exist on our own with no need for any other community), or just the institution where I participate in and practice my faith, and all of these are true. However, we need to always remember that a parish is literally, a gathering of exiles, of a people who don't have a home in this world, because we are all journeying toward the heavenly home in the world to come. This means that all parishes, wherever they are, are participating in the same journey.... that all people, regardless of which parish they belong to, are journeying towards the same destination.... that we are all one family of sojourners.... Within a family, changes occur, and no family stays the same. So too with our parishes, what was before must change to something different; without it, our sojourning towards our true home becomes more difficult and it becomes harder to see the path towards our destination....

Any journey is easier and more pleasant when we have others beside us, which is what a parish is about. This is what our family of parishes is about....

As we continue our Journey of Faith, let us keep in mind that all of us are exiles, journeying together towards our true home, where God dwells... a place of safety, warmth, comfort, rest and peace....

Hello! My name is <u>Deacon Matthew Pohlman</u>, and I am from St. Gerald's Parish in Ralston. Growing up in the same parish as many of my extended family members is incredible, as we can participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass together often. My Mom, Dad, and four siblings have been influential in my response to the Lord's call- even to the point of "playing Mass" with me as a child.

I remember sitting in my first-grade classroom at St. Gerald the day St. John Paul II died. His death catalyzed my interest in the Catholic Faith, along with my parents' example of faith at home. As I grew in knowledge and maturity, the Holy Spirit led my prayers toward discernment of the priesthood. My faith was strengthened throughout my four years at Skutt Catholic High School. It was during numerous interactions, musical experiences, and visits with our Lord in the school chapel that I was graced with an overwhelming excitement for the priesthood.

Sharing in the priesthood of Jesus Christ is certainly a call beyond my lowliness, but seminary formation has taught me that the Father desires that we trust in His plan. For those young men considering seminary or who feel a call to a priestly vocation, I urge you to persevere in prayer, and continue to grow in your relationship with the Lord. 
Hey! I'm <u>Deacon Zach Eischeid</u>. I grew up in Elgin, Nebraska and belong to the Saint Boniface Parish. I attended Saint Boniface Elementary and graduated from Pope John XXIII Central Catholic High School. Saint Boniface Parish is a great place to learn about the Faith with our schools and to see so many parishioners helping each other and our parish in a myriad of ways.

My discernment has been around for as long as I can remember. Since I was a toddler, the priesthood always amazed me. However, around junior high, I kept pushing it to the back of my mind because I didn't want to be labeled as that "extra-religious guy." After graduating, I decided to attend Benedictine College to major in Theology. Towards the end of my first year at Benedictine, while at my sister's wedding dance, I oddly had a strong feeling about seminary. A month later, I attended the priest ordination while teaching Totus Tuus, and started weeping during the procession in the cathedral. This sign was big encouragement in finally giving my future in God's hands. Alligator OK to eat on Lenten Fridays

Alligator is permissible to eat on Fridays of Lent, the archbishop of New Orleans assured a conscientious parishioner, and his approval has been backed by the national bishops' conference.

"Concerning the question if alligator is acceptable to eat during the Lenten season...yes, the alligator is considered in the fish family," Archbishop Gregory M. Aymond wrote in a 2010 letter provided to CNA by the New Orleans archdiocese Feb. 15.

"The law of abstinence binds those who have completed their fourteenth year," canon law continues.

"Abstinence laws consider that meat comes only from animals such as chickens, cows, sheep or pigs - all of which live on land. Birds are also considered meat...Fish are a different category of animal. Salt and freshwater species of fish, amphibians, reptiles, (cold-blooded animals) and shellfish are permitted."

Since alligators are reptiles and therefore cold-blooded, their flesh does not count as "meat" from which U.S. Catholics must abstain on Fridays in Lent.

Other reptiles that could presumably be consumed on Lenten Fridays include turtles, snakes, and tortoises. The bishops indicate that foods such as chicken broth, meat gravies or sauces, "as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are technically not forbidden."
