Catholic Social Teaching Series: Human Dignity

Today I want to continue our bulletin series that Fr. John and I are giving on Catholic Social Teaching. Last week we considered the Common Good, and today we will discuss the most foundational principle of Human Dignity. Pope Benedict explained that "as far as the Catholic Church is concerned, the principal focus of her interventions in the public arena is the protection and promotion of the dignity of the person."

We believe that all human life is sacred. God has revealed to us that we, male and female, have been made in his image and likeness (Genesis 1:26). We are unique from all other creatures in that we have a body and spiritual soul that enables us to know and love in a finite way that images the infinite knowledge and perfect love of God himself. Not even sin can take away the fact that we are in his image (Genesis 9:6). Furthermore, as Christians won through the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we have been adopted as children of God, beloved sons and daughters of the Father. Those who are not among the baptized, God also loves so much, desiring they too enter his family, the Church. Even those whom we disagree with or those who might do things to take away the dignity of others, we still see them as made in God's image. We recognize without exception, the great worth of every human being.

Based on this understanding of the dignity of the human person, we have certain principles which are not negotiable. Pope Benedict called our attention to three specifically: 1) protection of human life in all stages, 2) promotion of the family, 3) and protection of the rights of parents to educate their children. Primary among even these three is the first, the protection of human life, from the first moment of conception until natural death. At the foundation of every issue is the right to life.

Thus we must oppose direct attacks on human life from abortion, euthanasia, embryonic stem cell research, unjust war, terrorism and the death penalty. Catholics care about many issues, because at the foundation of them all is the right to life. As I talked about last week, we care about the common good and the poor. Why? Because human life matters. We care about just economics, fair immigration policies, the environment, and healthcare, because how these affect human lives. But, as the US Bishops have reiterated, "the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed." Our Catholic pro-life message and action today must not only seek to protect the unborn, but also include care for the needs of mothers who often feel they have no other choice. Abortion exploits women because it deceives a woman into sacrificing her child for the sake of self interest, rather than living real human love, making sacrifices for the sake of the child.

Speaking of children, that leads us to the other two areas: promotion of marriage and the family and the rights of parents to educate their children. These are also essential to protecting the dignity of human persons. We must defend marriage as a union between one man and one woman. Not only are individual persons made in God's image, so too is marriage and family. The Scriptures often use human marriage to help us understand our relationship with God, like we see in the gospel today: we are all invited to the wedding feast of heaven, as the spouse of Christ. (Matthew 22:1-14)

We certainly have theological reasons for defending marriage, but there are also natural reasons that are easier to share when working to defend marriage and family in the public sphere. Marriage is the only institution meant not just to unite a husband and wife, but meant to ensure moms and dads are united to their children. All that the Church teaches with regard to sexuality, marriage, and family can be spoken of in terms of the protection of the dignity of children.

A few weeks ago many people were horrified at a film promoted on Netflix sexualizing children, an affront to their dignity as human beings. I don't want to focus so much on that movie itself, but think about how we have reached a point where some people think such a thing is ok. Such exploitation of children didn't just come out of the blue; our world has been falling down a slippery slope for a while now. There is a reason why our Catholic faith is adamantly opposed to so much in our culture from the sexual revolution.

We can begin with the breakdown of adult married relationships which so often lead to divorce. Pope Francis notes how the "souls of their children suffer" in those situations. Next, fornication, cohabitation and contraception are all variations that separate the act of spousal union from the possibility of children, making it all about the pleasure of adults, excluding an openness to the gift of life. This contributes to what Pope Francis describes as "a society ... which does not love being surrounded by children, which considers them above all a worry, a weight, a risk." Even our Supreme Court has acknowledged a link between this contraceptive attitude and abortion, saying abortion needs to be legal because many have become reliant "on the availability of abortion in the event that contraception should fail." Abortion itself clearly exploits children, as it is literally the killing of an unborn child.

If marriage becomes only about personal fulfillment for adults, without a thought to children, then same-sex unions can be argued to be valid. Rather Pope Francis has said, same-sex unions are in "no way similar or even remotely analogous to God's plan for marriage and family." If such a union then seeks to have a child, the only way to make this happen is to purposefully separate a child from either their mother, or father, or both, since those unions by definition exclude one or the other. Also, the use of means such as IVF or surrogacy treat children as products we can make at our whim, rather than as persons to be received as a gift from God.

Promotion of same-sex relationships and gender theory has made its way now into some children's shows, exposing them to these ideas younger and younger. Pope Francis has pointed out numerous times that gender ideology tries to colonize our families, usurping the parents' right to educate their children. We find cases where gender theory proponents insist young children can be transgender, even advocating for hormonal and surgical alteration, which, in opposition to the best child development science, one could see as being on the level of child abuse.

Finally, pornography teaches the mind to treat people as objects. With its widespread ease of access, children can accidentally find it, becoming trapped for years in a cycle of shame. With its ever more gross forms, we ought to be horrified, if not entirely surprised, that all this has led to nearly normalizing even lewd visual material depicting a child. If we have been asleep to the way these things have been harming adults, maybe we will wake up to the devastation they have on our children.

As Catholics we must speak up and reject these things as contrary to human dignity, including in the public sphere. The reason for speaking up must be to help individuals become free from these things that harm their dignity. We condemn things that harm people; but we want to heal the people themselves. As Pope Francis is fond of saying, the Church is a field hospital for the weak and infirm, to restore their worth and dignity. The king in the gospel parable (God) sends his servants (us) to find guests to bring to the banquet, the good and bad alike. We are called to introduce people to the bridegroom Jesus, so that turning from what can harm them, their worth and dignity restored, they may be dressed in the wedding garment of God's grace.

In late September, the archdiocese concluded an investigation into allegations of sexual misconduct with minors against a deceased priest, Fr. Theodore "Ted" Richling, Jr. The investigation was in response to an allegation we received earlier this summer. Fr. Richling died in 2019. The conclusion of the investigation led to the substantiation of multiple instances of sexual misconduct with minors. This matter has been referred to the Douglas County Attorney.

Fr. Richling was assigned as: Pastor of St. Bonaventure Parish in Raeville from 1988-1990

The Archdiocese of Omaha remains committed to the protection of young people and vulnerable adults, the prevention of abuse, healing for victims of abuse and cooperating with civil authorities. 3) The facility mails the check/scale ticket to the charity. **NOTE:** Donations of grain *in the charity's name* cannot be claimed as an itemized charitable contribution so therefore will be posted as such on your end of the year contribution statement from the parish.
